The Vice President for Student Affairs & Enrollment Management (VPSAEM) serves as Wiley College's senior student affairs and enrollment management officer and reports directly to the President. The VPSAEM works collaboratively to create a campus culture that promotes student success, to provide a safe and welcoming campus environment for a diverse student body, and to foster a sense of community among the students. The VPSAEM provides strategic leadership and direction to the College's comprehensive effort to maximize and sustain enrollments and engages with a broad range of College leaders and external organizations to create, implement and influence policies, initiatives and services that positively impact student enrollment, retention, engagement and satisfaction. The VPSAEM strategically plans, attracts and enrolls qualified students to ensure optimum levels of enrollment. The VPSAEM plays an important role as participant and leader in the College's overall promotional efforts, working closely with faculty, staff and leadership to enhance the reputation of the institution locally, regionally and nationally. The VPSAEM is specifically responsible for the overall leadership, administration and management of the Division of Student Affairs & Enrollment Management. These responsibilities include:

- **Career Center:** job search, career development, internships, co-operative education programming, and graduate school placement;
- **Dean of Students:** student conduct, judicial affairs, housing and residence life, residential programming and education, and academic/financial aid appeals committee;
- **Enrollment Management:** admissions, recruitment, new student orientation and engagement programming;
- **Student Health, Counseling and Wellness:** health and counseling services, TRiO student support services, tutoring center, and accessibility services;
- **Student Life:** student activities, student organizations, student leadership and development, student health services, spirit shop, greek life, and Student Union.

In July 2014, the Divisions of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management were merged to create the Division of Student Affairs & Enrollment Management to focus on achieving institutional retention goals by aligning the new student pipeline with all first- and second-year retention support services and programming, enhancing the student experiences. The Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs & Enrollment Management was responsible to the Chancellor for providing visionary leadership and strategic direction to the enrollment and student affairs divisions for graduates and undergraduates in support of the academic mission of the University. The Vice Chancellor managed a budget in excess of \$25 million and supervises approximately 300 staff, including administrative professionals, directors, classified staff, and student workers in the areas of Admissions & Recruitment, Campus Dining, Career Services, Center for Undergraduate Student Achievement, Financial Aid, Horace W. Moody, Sr. Intramural & Recreational Sports Complex, Student Orientation & Leadership Development, Residence Life & Housing, Smith-Brown Memorial Union, Student Health Center, Student Life, Student Programs & Greek Life, Student Media, Student Organizations, University Counseling Center and University Events. The Vice Chancellor worked collaboratively to support related service missions, such as TRiO Student Support Services, orientation, recruitment and retention. The Vice Chancellor planned, developed, managed, and administered programs and strategies for enrollment management and student affairs that supported the University's strategic plan and mission and collaborated with academic and campus leadership to develop and implement a comprehensive strategic plan to recruit, retain, and serve a vibrant and diverse student body. The Vice Chancellor chaired the Enrollment Management Council and developed a comprehensive enrollment management plan that complemented both Southern University's strategic goals and the University System's strategic priorities, in collaboration with Academic Affairs, to coordinate and facilitate a cross-divisional, cooperative, and integrated approach to recruitment, admissions, enrollment, persistence, and degree completion across academic colleges and programs.

***Selected Accomplishments:***

- Increased first-time freshman enrollment by 30% reversing negative institutional enrollment trend.
- Created and implemented the “*Pathway to Prominence*” Recruitment Tour which resulted in an increase of undergraduate admission applications to the University by 83%.
